Alongside our focus on classroom learning, we try to provide a wide range of opportunities for learners to participate in out of class activities. After winning for the past two years, we had high hopes for further success in the Singapore 3rd International Chinese Language Competition for International Schools, which was organised and supported by HSK, HanBan and the Embassy of the People's Republic of China. 50 students represented NISS at the Chinese Speaking and Chinese Talent Show at River Valley High School, competing against 12 other international schools.

This competition is made up of 3 parts; a Writing test (30%), a Speaking test (40%) and the Chinese Cultural Talent Show (30%).

Nexus students gave a bold, colourful and artistic performance. It was a stunning spectacle and it must have been obvious to all in the auditorium that Nexus had secured a top place, long before it was officially announced. The costumes and stage settings were stunning and the whole programme was beautifully executed. In the end the judges awarded first prize to a primary school with the Nexus performance earning the runner up award.

Everyone in our tutor group had a specific job to make the Coin Challenge successful. Jobs such as photography, digital designing for posters and our 'coin collector badge', measuring the long trail with a meter stick, helping the younger children put down their coins. Counting all the coins at the end was a job everyone had to take part in!

On the day, learners from across the school brought numerous coins and made the longest coin trail ever created at Nexus!! The trail went around the low school walls at the entrance, past the fish pond, round the canteen and even on some of the benches! There were so many coins that the trail had to double up. It was great to see classes from Nursery to Year 13 taking part in this activity together and having fun. Two younger students brought their money boxes and donated all the contents! At the end of lunch break, Y12B collected in all the coins, all 355 metres. Can you imagine how heavy they all were? Can imagine how long it took to count 355 metres of coins? Almost 3 hours! But we all did it, even though we were tired and had dirty hands at the end. It was a great feeling to make so much money to help the people of devastated towns and villages. Thank you Mrs Hilary for making this all possible and thank you to the teachers, Mr Thomas in Finance, parents and students for all taking part. It was worth it in the end.

We raised **4,020 DOLLARS**, which is amazing!

A cheque for this amount will go to 'Operation Walang Iwlang : Typhoon Yolanda (Haiyan)'

12 Hour Race

Some of you may have heard about the 12 Hour Race against Trafficking that took place on 16 November.

3 teams of Nexus runners took part in the 12 hour run at UWC Dover to raise awareness of Human Trafficking and to raise funds for the amazing Somaly Mam Foundation <http://www.somaly.org>

Somaly Mam, who was sold into sexual slavery in Cambodia at a very young age, set up the Somaly Mam Foundation. After seeing her best friend murdered she decided she could no longer "keep her silence" and escaped. Somaly has since dedicated her life to saving the victims of Human Trafficking, providing them with a hope for a future.

For those who know little about Human Trafficking, it is a serious crime, which involves abduction of children and even adults and then using them for malicious reasons. This is a serious issue, which is happening in almost all parts of the world, and our main aim is to work as a group and try to raise awareness of these issues to stop the trafficking.



The Somaly Mam Foundation supports anti-trafficking organisations; provides both practical and emotional support to victims and continues to highlight the horror of human trafficking. They have assisted over 7000 victims to date. For her tireless work, Somaly has been honoured as one of Time Magazine's 100 Most Influential People of 2009 and as a CNN Hero.

Eight international schools from across Singapore ran for the cause. Runners participated in teams, running from 9am in the morning until 9pm in the evening, including through torrential rain. It was a great success, with 15 Nexus learners participating

in the run, as part of two male and one female teams: Daniel, Michael, Philip, Oliver and Alan; Cameron, Matthew, Fredrik and David; Belle, Selenge, Bolor, Erita, Lucy and Camille.

Primary School

A Celebration of Learning

Last week was another exciting week in school as the Primary School hosted two Mini-Exhibitions. Learners in Nursery and Kindergarten shared with their families their learning about *In Our Garden*. They showed the visitors how to plant seeds and tend plants, explained how to decide whether things are living or non-living, shared their artwork inspired by nature and showed how they had created bird and butterfly feeders to care for the creatures in our garden.

In Years 5 and 6 the learners showed visitors all of the scientific understanding that they had developed in their UOI, *Energy may be converted, transformed and used to support human progress*. The children demonstrated their complex machines and explained the various forces at work and unveiled their designs for the ultimate theme park ride. There was even time to share some of their recent learning in Mathematics.

Celebration of Leadership

If you have been in school recently, you might have noticed some fun activities taking place in the Lower Primary School play spaces. The Year 6 learners together with the Student Council are leading an initiative at playtime to engage younger learners in a series of fun activities. Prior to starting this initiative, the Year 6 learners took part in role-playing activities to help them to coordinate the activities and resolve minor conflicts. The younger children have thoroughly enjoyed their new activities. Many thanks to Ms Polin, Ms Susan and Ms Jessie for supporting the children with this development and to the NPG for providing the play resources.

Year 6 learners have also shown real compassion as they worked to package up all of the food and hygiene items that members of the school community have generously donated to the people of the Philippines who are suffering from the effects of the recent typhoon. Typing Club

In our continuing efforts to improve our learners' digital skills, Nexus Singapore has provided all learners free

access to the Typing Club, an online program designed to assist with learning and improving typing speeds. Learners will be able to use the site to practise the fundamentals of touch-typing at their own pace. To access the site learners simply need to visit <https://nexus-singapore.typingclub.com/> and sign in using their school Gmail account and password. By using the program, learners should be able to improve their typing speed to 10-12 words per minutes in a matter of days. Secondary News

As we continue our focus on curriculum areas, this week we hear from the Arts departments.

Visual Arts

Year 13

The IB Art exhibition in May 2014 will be small, as we will only have two students displaying their work. Sadly, Syafiq will be leaving us in December to return to Malaysia. He is presently exploring animation, bringing life to his hand made figure with stop motion animation. Both Joshua and Wendy are determined to make an impact with their work. Joshua is busy creating studio pieces by recycling junk, old computers, cardboard boxes and beer cans. Wendy is using more conventional materials but her pieces are supersized.



Year 12

Year 12 learners have started their IB Visual Arts course with the focus being on 'The Purpose of Art'. Discussions on why we make art have been lively and were followed up with work in their Investigative Work

Books (IWB). The discussions are always topical, so the announcement of stolen art works from WWII found in Munich led the students to investigate the Degenerate Art Exhibition organised by the Nazis in 1927.

The IWB will help the learners to track their knowledge, understanding and development as an artist over the next two years. They are working on their first studio piece; their media choice is varied: acrylic paints, plaster bandage, wire, pen and ink and an old book.

Year 11

Always busy and creative, Year 11 learners have worked on poster designs for imaginary school activities. Their focus now is on carefully observed works from primary source objects and increasing their skills in a range of different media.



Year 10

The learners have been immersed in observational drawings in their initial phase of the IGCSE Art & Design course. They have been documenting their visual explorations with drawings, paintings and photography. Their study of art history has influenced them to use preferred artist's styles and techniques in their representations. They are moving onto the design process where their preferences range from fashion design to creating a character for a video game.

Year 9

Using a theme of architecture, the learners started by discovering basic techniques of composing an artwork and using one point perspective as inspiration for a 3D sculpture. After a historical look at the eclectic Singapore shop house, the learners are developing a large water colour and ink drawing of a shop house elevation.



Year 8

A unit on portraiture has our learners studying faces, symmetry and learning historical facts from 'reading' portraits. 'The Ambassadors' by Hans Holbein has inspired self-portrait drawings in which the fashions and technology of 1533 is replaced by today's equivalent. What a difference 480 years make! This project will be complete soon, so look out for the display in B2 pod.



Year 7

Looking at the basics of all art, the learners are discovering the elements and principles of art and design. Experimenting with different types of line in different media led to a Paul Klee inspired work. They are now qualifying as Pantone colour mixers and taking the naming of their colour palette charts very seriously. Soon they will be introduced to the wonderful world of Henri Matisse's colours.

A special 'Thank You' to Ellen Loveday, Mum of Tyler in Year 9 for her very generous donation of twelve wooden easels to the art studio. They have been put to immediate use! Thank you.

Drama

Our talented Year 11 Drama learners are currently rehearsing a section of Arthur Miller's 20th century classic play, *The Crucible*, for their final group assessment.

The play, which is set in Salem, Massachusetts in 1692, concerns the real life events which led to the conviction and hanging of nineteen men and women for the crime of witchcraft. Shockingly, it was the testimonies of young girls that led to the arrest of a large number of villagers and ultimately to the execution of nineteen members of their community.



Year 11 will perform a sequence from towards the end of Act III. It is a highly charged, emotional section of the play that demonstrates the absolute power of the girls to control the outcome of court proceedings. Central to the girls' power is the character of Abigail Williams; where she goes the other girls follow. This leading role is played by Clarisse Ong.

"It's a really challenging scene. The dialogue is complicated and I have to convince the character of Danforth that I see a yellow bird even though John Proctor yells out that I am lying. It's a really intense performance." - Clarisse Ong



The group will present their assessment piece to an invited audience on Wednesday, 4 December.

Year 7 - 9 learners have been exploring a variety of scripts in order to understand how to take a play from page to stage. Year 7 and Year 8 learners will be creating short theatrical trailers in response to their texts: *Sparkleshark* and *Frankenstein* respectively. In Year 9 learners will perform extracts from Dennis Kelly's critically acclaimed play, *DNA*.

It is very important to expose learners to a variety of theatre texts. In term 1 we focused on aspects of improvisation across the Year levels and now, in term 2, I am asking learners to think about how we might interpret a given playwright's words, develop character in performance and how we might stage particular scenes given the evidence in the text. I've been especially impressed by the character work in Year 9 – the standard of some of the responses has been excellent and genuinely exciting to watch.

Music

A lot has been going on in music at all levels as learners have been preparing for their IGCSE solo performances, the Christmas Fête and the Nexus Winter Variety Show in December. A positive vibe is evident around the school as more learners are becoming interested in a range of musical instruments with some taking up lessons and starting their own bands at lunch and break time.

Year 7

Learners have been exploring and performing songs from different cultures and traditions. Throughout this unit, learners will explore harmony, riffing, rounds, call and response and canon as they sing songs from England, America, Australia, Africa, China, France, Korea and India in different styles such as rap, gospel, classical, beat boxing, soul and musical theatre. In addition to this, the learners will also be

learning a number of Christmas carols for a performance at the Christmas Fête and the Winter Variety Show.

Year 8

The year 8 learners have been exploring reggae music and the idea of 'off beat'. They have been researching the life of Bob Marley and have been singing a range of his songs. Throughout the unit, they will explore different styles of reggae ranging from Ska to Dancehall as well as perform various reggae style pieces in groups (chords, bass line and melody). Additionally, learners will compose their own reggae piece on *Garageband* or live instrument and perform them back to the class.



Year 9

In Year 9, learners have been exploring traditional Indian music and instruments. They have also been singing Indian songs and have even performed a bhangra routine while exploring the Bollywood genre. Throughout this unit, learners will improve on their knowledge of notation and scales by composing melodies using different ragas. They will also improve on their understanding of the different Indian instruments and sounds by composing different rhythmic patterns and drones to fit with their melodies. Learners are making impressive progress and are now composing using standard notation and playing in time to a metronome.



Year 10

The IGCSE group have just finished an amazing performance at the Chinese International Schools competition where they performed on Chinese drums to accompany a dance performance. In lessons, they are composing a dance piece on *Garageband* for their first composition (this piece will include music and vocals which the learners write and perform themselves). In addition to this, the learners are also preparing ensemble pieces for the Winter Variety Show for which they will organise, sing and play on the night.

Year 11

This year group have been working hard on the solo and ensemble performances and have produced some high quality pieces on the piano as well as vocal. They have also been improving their knowledge of music from around the world: countries or regions such as Mexico, India, Latin America, Africa, China, Japan, Arabia and Indonesia. Furthermore they have been listening and appraising music from different periods such as Baroque, Classical, Romantic and 20th Century music and well as studying the works of famous composers such as Beethoven and Mozart in order to prepare them for their exams next year.

Extra Curricular and Other Activities

The number of learners taking instrumental lessons has increased since the programme started in September and we now have a range of learners learning different instruments, the most popular being voice, violin and flute. We expect the number of learners to increase even more by the end of the year as applications are still coming in!



The Glee Club this year has continued to grow and members have been working on a brilliant number for the Winter Variety Show, which will surely top their performance last year. They have even made a music video to showcase their vocal ability and promote the event.

Science

The learners in Year 7 have been discovering the science behind cooking over the last few weeks. Activities have included finding the melting points of foods, observation of chemical and physical changes and the three methods of heat transfer. However, there have been two main highlights so far: the making of Ice Cream and working with Dry Ice.



The learners made ice cream using a salt/ice mixture to lower the temperature to around -10 Degrees Celsius in order to freeze the

ingredients quickly so as to produce small ice crystals and hence a smooth ice cream. Many of the learners then joyfully inflicted this recipe on their parents, some of them many times over!



The Dry Ice day was lots of fun whilst of course being educational. Dry Ice is solid carbon dioxide and it sublimates (turns from solid to gas with no liquid state in between) at about -79 degrees Celsius. We used it to make ice cream very quickly indeed and in many other experiments such as exploding bottles and rocket launches.

Heston Blumenthal is a Three Michelin Starred chef who uses a great deal of science in his cooking. Some of his most famous dishes include The Sounds Of The Sea, Triple-Cooked Chips and Snail Porridge! The learners have thoroughly enjoyed seeing some clips of his work, in particular the Edible Fairytale House and the Willy Wonka Chocolate Waterfall, and some students seem to be watching a great deal of his creations on YouTube outside of lessons.

Parents should be warned that learners are currently experimenting with their perfect pancake recipes...

All our Secondary learners took part in a ten day language challenge last week, competing against eighteen other schools in Asia. They practised their language skills not only in Chinese, French and Spanish, but also in a host of other languages as diverse as Greek, Maori and Arabic.

This was the first time we have taken part in this competition, and we did encouragingly well. Overall, we scored 83,452 points, which placed us in sixth place, a fantastic ranking given that we were competing against some schools much bigger than ourselves. One Year 12 learner, Annabelle Harwood, scored over 9000 points and came fourth overall.

We would like to congratulate all those who took part, and particularly those who scored over 1000 points. You know who you are!
